### THE LIFE AND LEGACY OF THURGOOD MARSHALL

In 1925, an outgoing and strong-willed young man enrolled in Lincoln University of Pennsylvania. Tenacious, skillful, and persuasive, the young man quickly became the university's star debater. After graduating *cum laude* with distinction, he enrolled in Howard University Law School, where he graduated at the top of his class in 1933. At that time, no one could have predicted that in 1967, Thurgood Marshall would become the first African-American justice of the United States Supreme Court.

Justice Marshall's commitment to education began as a young lawyer fighting the State of Maryland for equal pay for Black school teachers who were receiving the same salary as janitors. Throughout his career, Thurgood Marshall worked within the legal system to make his vision of equal access to education a reality through precedent-setting court cases. In Brown vs. Board of Education, the United States Supreme Court struck down the "Separate but Equal" doctrine, thus ending legalized segregation of educational institutions.

After winning a difficult racial discrimination case against the University of Maryland, Thurgood Marshall declared, "We're in the education business!" It is this legacy and commitment to education that is the foundation of the Thurgood Marshall College Fund's (TMCF's) vision: Changing the World...One Leader at a Time.

### THURGOOD MARSHALL COLLEGE FUND

### WHERE EDUCATION PAYS OFF

The Thurgood Marshall College Fund (TMCF), formerly the Thurgood Marshall Scholarship Fund, is named for the U.S. Supreme Court's first African-American justice. It was established in 1987 under the leadership of Dr. N. Joyce Payne in cooperation with Miller Brewing Co., Sony Music, the NBA, Reebok, and the American Association for State Colleges and Universities. TMCF supports and represents nearly 300,000 students attending its 47 member-schools that include *public* Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs), medical schools and law schools. TMCF helps students with a clear intention and the motivation to succeed and acquire a high-quality college education at an affordable cost. TMCF also efficiently connects high performing, world-ready students with top tier employment opportunities—access that students or employers might not have on their own. Through its scholarships and programs, TMCF plays a key role in preparing the leaders of tomorrow.

To date, TMCF has provided more than \$200 million in scholarships and programmatic and capacity building support to students and member-schools. TMCF member-schools are a critical source of higher education for all students. More than eighty percent of all students enrolled in HBCUs attend TMCF member-schools. Many TMCF member-school graduates have become leaders in the business, government and entertainment industries. However, few of these achievements would be possible without the support of the TMCF.

### **PROGRAMS**

Here at the Thurgood Marshall College Fund, we do more than offer scholarships, we enhance the educational experience with programs and conferences for students and faculty. In addition, we offer grants to support our member-school faculty with research projects and aim to support the overall personal and professional growth of every TMCF participant.

### PROGRAM DESCRIPTIONS

### Teacher Quality and Retention Program

The Teacher Quality and Retention Program (TQRP) was designed to help teachers enhance the learning experience of students. Now, more than ever, our students need qualified teachers who can help them overcome challenging school environments and achieve academic and personal success. Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs) graduate more minority teachers than any other source.

TQRP provides one-week summer institutes designed to give education majors experience in the application of educational theories and practices. This training will equip future teachers with the skills they need to successfully enter high-need schools in urban and rural communities. Selected STEM majors will take part in a two-week fellowship designed to expose those considering a career in education to the latest theories and practices associated with exemplary science and mathematics instruction. Program fellows will attend one of four Institutes being held around the country.

### Leadership Institute and Recruitment Fair

The Leadership Institute and Recruitment Fair is a national program that includes a four-day conference designed to provide leadership development, career training, internship and employment opportunities to top students at TMCF's member network of *public* HBCUs. Participants include students who are interviewed and selected via a highly competitive process. These scholars include high-performing students in business, STEM, education and other fields. As a result of the conference, many of TMCF's Leadership Institute participants receive internships and employment offers with private and public sector industries. These students are tracked throughout their internship experience and their first year of employment. TMCF Leadership Institute program evaluation metrics include internship and employment offer rates as well as job performance and retention.



### PROGRAMS cont'd

### Member-Universities Professional Institute

The Member-Universities Professional Institute (MUPI) is a national program that includes a yearly two-day conference designed to provide professional development, networking and best-practice sharing among administration, faculty and staff of TMCF's member network of *public* HBCUs. MUPI includes a one-day leadership summit designed especially for university presidents, chancellors and law school deans. In addition to the two-day conference, TMCF's Government Affairs and Programs divisions lead capacity-building initiatives with MUPI participants. These initiatives include an International Collaboration Group (ICG), which is pursing federal grants for work in Sierra Leon and Brazil; a technology resources initiative, which seeks to expand cloud-computing capabilities among *public* HBCUs; access to collaborative partnerships including UNCF's Building Green Initiative, the Institute for International Education's (IIE) faculty study abroad program, and others.

### Supporting Education for Returning Veterans

The Supporting Education for Returning Veterans (SERV) program is designed to help veterans returning from the Iraq and Afghanistan wars, (Operation Enduring Freedom [OEF], Operation Iraqi Freedom [OIF]) and interested in obtaining a college degree majoring in science, technology, engineering or mathematics (STEM).

### Consortium for Undergraduate STEM Success

The Consortium for Undergraduate STEM Success (CUSTEMS) is a collaboration of post-secondary institutions interested addressing issues relating to undergraduate degree completion in STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics) fields, with particular focus on under-represented students. CUSTEMS combines student academic data from participating institutions with survey responses from those same students to inform institutions about patterns of student migration into and out of STEM fields.

### SCHOLARSHIPS & CAPACITY BUILDING

Research studies show a leading barrier to degree attainment is the student's inability to afford college. According to the National Center for Education Statistics, the attainment of Bachelors' degrees has largely remained stagnant.

Since its inception in 1987, Thurgood Marshall College Fund (TMCF) has provided scholarships to qualified students attending its member-schools. These scholarships have provided financial support to help fund their education at one our nation's *public* Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs).

TMCF provides merit-based scholarships to students seeking financial assistance to complete their education. TMCF scholarship recipients are awarded annually to students meeting the TMCF eligibility criteria. Awards are made each semester based on a verification process designed to ensure that students are meeting academic expectations and have an unmet financial need.

All classifications of students are invited to apply for a TMCF scholarship.

### TMCF Scholarships:

- Are merit and financial need based
- Are renewed annually; awardees must reapply
- Are awarded to defray the cost of tuition, on-campus room and board, books and fees
- Are full tuition scholarships (average tuition at a public HBCU is \$6,300 per year)
- Are paid to the member-school on behalf of the students to be credited to their school accounts

### Capacity Building

Faculty research, fellowships and student internship opportunities provide rich opportunities for discovery and keep TMCF member-schools and their graduates globally competitive. Through partnerships with federal agencies, TMCF provides faculty research grants, technical support, internships and fellowships to faculty and students attending its network of member-schools.

### **INTERNSHIPS**

Thurgood Marshall College Fund's (TMCF's) Internship Program delivers on two key elements of our mission statement:

- → Identify and prepare students attending member-schools who have significant leadership potential
- Create a pipeline for employers to highly qualified member-school students and alumni

TMCF has a track record of helping talented students find internships that accelerate their career prospects. TMCF's search for talented students is conducted throughout its 47 member-school network and facilitated by meeting with key staff members at each school as well as through its own network of career counselors who conduct on-campus interviews and evaluations. TMCF brings its decades-long experience in identifying talent to help recruit student interns for TMCF's collaborating partners. The TMCF Internship Manager works closely, and in concert with, highly-qualified students to create an ideal path for success.

The identification process is implemented by pre-screening students for geographic preferences, career objectives, and matching TMCF's partners' needs. Qualified applicants demonstrate personal effectiveness competencies such as active listening skills, presentation skills, professionalism, dependability & reliability, interpersonal skills and self awareness in order to model the behavior of a student for whom the talent acquisition team determines is the best recruit.

TMCF's Internship program seeks students who attend a member-school and maintain a minimum GPA of 3.0. TMCF maintains responsibility for presenting highly-qualified intern candidates and assisting selected students in finding housing and in making travel arrangements. TMCF also serves as a liaison and provides support to students throughout the Internship program. TMCF's employer partners directly supervise, and ideally, provide a mentor for each intern.

Through this development process, TMCF seeks to develop future leaders and help them get the most from their education.

### TALENT ACQUISITION

Thurgood Marshall College Fund's (TMCF's) Talent Acquisition team developed a strategy to deliver on two key elements of our mission statement:

- → Identify and prepare students attending member-schools who have significant leadership potential
- Create a pipeline for employers to highly qualified member-school students and alumni

The team works with a dedicated campus liaison on each campus to coordinate visits and meetings with various faculty and administrators. This allows the best students to be identified and interviewed by the Talent Acquisition team. Visits are conducted in a two-day format, with two or three members visiting a campus during the first semester; and one-day visits with two or three members during the fall semester.

The team seeks to pinpoint specific students who will contribute most to employer success. Key to this identification process is connecting our Talent Acquisition team with a representative from our partners' Human Resource, Talent Acquisition, and/or Campus Recruitment division. The outcome of this collaboration is to gain a clear understanding of the employer's work environment, skill set criteria, and characteristics and traits sought in a candidate.

Students are screened for geographic preferences, career objectives, and leadership potential. Potential leaders must demonstrate personal effectiveness competencies such as active listening skills, presentation skills, professionalism, dependability & reliability, interpersonal skills and self awareness prior to being selected to attend TMCF's leadership institute or other student-focused events. Over time, these personal effectiveness competencies are the foundation from which TMCF seeks to develop future leaders and help them get the most from their education.







### STUDENT AMBASSADORS

Thurgood Marshall College Fund's (TMCF's) Student Ambassadors deliver on two key elements of our mission statement:

- ↑ Identify and prepare students attending member-schools who have significant leadership potential
- ◆ Create a pipeline for employers to highly qualified member-school students and alumni

The student ambassador works with a dedicated campus liaison on each campus to coordinate visits and meetings with various faculty and administrators. This allows the best students to be identified and interviewed by the Talent Acquisition team. Visits are conducted in a two-day format, with two or three members visiting a campus during the first semester; and one-day visits with two or three members during the fall semester.

In addition, Student Ambassadors serve as positive, energetic, well-informed mentors and role models to their campus peers and the community-at-large. Student ambassadors promote TMCF programs and services as well as perform other duties focusing on three primary objectives:

- → Identification & Development: Assist TMCF with the identification, development, and retention of campus talent
- Outreach: Represent TMCF at campus and community events to include on-campus college fairs, career and major fairs, and speaking on panels or to audiences from the campus and/or the community
- ← Campus Events and Activities: Host a TMCF campus-wide event to include Leadership Institute Informational, New Student Orientations, Commencement, and annual campus-wide events such as Black History Month, voter registration and blood drives

Student ambassadors are charged with being campus leaders who must demonstrate personal effectiveness competencienal skills and self awareness in order to model the behavior of a student for which the Talent Acquisition team recruits. Over time, TMCF student ambassadors will consistently prove to be a catalyst for the advancement of the TMCF vision to *Change the World...One Leader at a Time*.



### **POLICY & ADVOCACY**

### THURGOOD MARSHALL COLLEGE FUND SCHOLARS CAN CHANGE THE WORLD: POLICY AND ADVOCACY BENEFITS OUR COUNTRY AND THE PLANET

The Thurgood Marshall College Fund Government Affairs team focus is policy and advocacy that benefits the students we represent attending TMCF member-schools. TMCF maintains many federal partnerships through memorandum of understanding agreements with several federal departments and agencies, and forms TMCF consortia among the national network of faculty talent from across America to benefit the nation and people around the planet. With extensive backgrounds in government service and public affairs in the private sector, our Government Affairs team seeks many ways to advance the education of TMCF Scholars and enable them to change the world. With 75 years of public and government affairs experience combined, the TMCF Government Affairs team has a reputation for cutting-edge advocacy by working closely with Congress, the executive branch, regulatory agencies in Washington, and other advocacy and policy-oriented NGOs around the world.

TMCF Government Affairs has regular opportunities for students to be engaged in our government through our annual Civic Responsibility Conference. This educational conference invites 100 of the brightest TMCF Scholars from around the nation to learn about our constitution and our democracy, and interact with high officials of our federal government and the Congress. TMCF Government Affairs also facilitates direct requests from the executive branch, federal agencies and Congress for internship opportunities for the best and brightest of our scholars to learn from working directly inside our government. Additionally, we seek opportunities for students to develop professionally while they are in school as well. With many opportunities to form partnerships with federal agencies, we know students can gain valuable experience while working in internships here in Washington.

For TMCF Government Affairs, our work must be in the public interest. We try to instill the same sense of public service through all of the programs that Justice Marshall taught us by his example. From his early work as a student apprentice of Charles Hamilton Houston at the Howard University Law School, through his work as the head of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People Legal Office in New York – when he worked with others who achieved public service distinction with him in the victory in *Brown vs. the Board of Education*, and for all of his many years on the Supreme Court since his appointment by President Lyndon Johnson – the legacy of Justice Marshall's great life and work lives on through the scholars who we support and graduate from our schools. We work to advance their ability to complete college, and welcome any opportunity we may have to support their potential interest in a government career in either the Executive branch or Congress. So they may carry his legacy forward, our TMCF Government Affairs office seeks ways to facilitate any scholar's interest in public service and public affairs.

Additionally, the TMCF Government Affairs office tries to find ways to form consortia between our campuses in areas of expertise so we can take on some of the world's great needs. Government Affairs facilitates and supports a grants workshop series with follow-up grant proposal development so TMCF member-schools may form consortia between themselves in research and education. At our annual Member-Universities Professional Institute, TMCF Government Affairs convenes a series of workshops and member-school meetings to build teams to write and compete for grants in areas of mutual interest. Work in this area is both domestically and internationally focused.

On the policy front, we lead educational advocacy for our nearly 300,000 students who represent 80% of all students who attend the nation's HBCUs.
